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APPENDIX I BIOGRAPHY OF THE AUTHOR

Nicholas Walker is an American writer born on April 19, 1985. Walker grew up in Atlanta, Las Vegas, and Cleveland. He dropped out of John Carroll University and enlisted in the Army at the age of 19. From 2005 to 2006, Walker was a medic for the Army in Iraq. Before he enlisted in Iraq, he is married to a girl named Kara. Walker and his wife first-named Kara eloped before being kept in Iraq in 2005 and divorced a few months after his return in 2006. He is the lead singer and songwriter in the psychedelic garage rock band Safari, and they released the album *Maybe Tomorrow* in 1999. 2010. In August 2020, an interview reported Walker had married singer Rachel Rabbit White.

During his time as a medic for the Army in Iraq, he carried out more than 250 combat missions. After returning to civilian life, he developed undiagnosed PTSD, experienced depression and trauma, and became addicted to heroin. To fund his habit, he robbed ten banks around Cleveland over four months, beginning in December 2010. He was arrested in April 2011, pleaded guilty in 2012, and is sentenced to eleven years. In 2013, while Walker is behind bars at the Federal Penitentiary in Ashland, Kentucky, he is profiled on BuzzFeed. This led to correspondence with Matthew Johnson, a publisher at independent press Tyrant Books. Johnson sent Walker books and encouraged him to write about his life. He spent nearly four years writing and rewriting.

He is a US Army robbery veteran serving a prison sentence for bank robbery. But for his service in Iraq, Walker received seven medals and awards. His semi-autobiographical debut novel, *Cherry*, is published by Alfred A. Knopf on August 14, 2018. The resulting novel, *Cherry*, is published by Alfred A. Knopf and revolves around "the horrors of war and addiction." In the semi-autobiographical novel, a young man drops out of college and enlists in the Army. He came home poor, became addicted to opiates, and started robbing banks. According to *Vulture.com*, once published, the book received "near-universal acclaim." It debuted at number 14 on *The New York Times* bestseller list. Walker said he used the money from the book sales to pay back some of the banks he robbed. The book was selected for the 2019 Hemingway Foundation/PEN Award.

Within days of the book's publication, film rights were acquired for \$1 million by studio Joe and Anthony Russo AGBO, with the brothers planning to direct and produce, and the script will be written by Jessica Goldberg and starring Tom Holland as a character based on Walkers. Walker is offered the opportunity to

executive producer on the film, but he turned it down. The film, also called Cherry, will be released in theaters on February 26, 2021, and Apple TV+ on March 12, 2021.

APPENDIX II

SYNOPSIS OF THE STORY

Cherry, let's call it his name, he is 25 years old and lives in Cleveland, Ohio. He and his girlfriend Emily are both heroin addicts, and he has been robbing banks for drug money. After his last robbery, the police finally arrived, and it looked like he is about to be arrested. The initial story begins at the end of the year. Cherry is a freshman at a Jesuit college on the outskirts of Cleveland, where he grew up. His parents were rich, but he make extra money selling drugs. Emily is a woman he met at the same college, and they met for the first time. They immediately fell in love. However, Cherry eventually dropped out of college in search of direction and discipline in her life, enlisting in the army, much to Emily's disappointment.

It is 2005 Cherry enlisted in the army, and he is 20 years old. He is sent to Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri for basic training. He found basic training and fees, and he quickly regretted enlisting. Cherry is then sent to Fort Sam Houston in Texas, where he began training as a medic. He and Emily are still in a relationship, but he begins to worry that Emily will have sex with another man. He decided not to have sex with other women. He completed training at Fort Hood in Texas and then deployed to Iraq. His placed on a forward operating base, and he gradually finds that he does not have the supplies nor the training to provide any significant assistance to anyone as a medic. Although he hardly ever saw actual combat, he saw many deaths and injuries caused to American soldiers by improvised explosive devices planted by enemy fighters. He learns of the secret stockpile of medicine the soldiers make, and he begins buying and abusing prescription drugs to deal with the trauma of his situation.

After a year in Iraq, Cherry permanently returned to America. He returned to Cleveland and returned to college. However, his new drug addiction interferes with his ability to focus on schoolwork. Emily broke up with him after she found out that he is leaving with another woman. He started with a young woman named Libby. He suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder and other mental health issues. His drug addiction worsened, and he became addicted to the illegal drug, heroin. Then after that broke up with Libby. He and Emily finally resumed their relationship. Emily also became addicted to heroin. They are so attached that they are addicted to each other, and their heroin addiction is getting worse. Cherry uses student loan money to buy drugs, and she cultivates connections among various drug dealers. Eventually, Cherry and Emily run out of money to buy drugs, so Cherry robs a bank to get money. He executed several successful robberies. The final chapter ends with Cherry injecting another dose of heroin into her arm.
