CONCLUSION

From the data source, Donna Cooner's *Skinny*, there are 49 data in the form of utterances produced by the main character, Ever. These utterance can be divided into two types of illocutionary acts, assertive and directive. Those types of illocutionary acts have various purposes and functions that are differentiated into types of sentences, such as declarative, interrogative and imperative.

The first types of illocutionary is assertive that has been found about 22 data. All of the assertive data are in the form of declarative sentence. The purpose of assertive is to inform. In this case, the main character, Ever informs something to the other characters such as Rat, Briella, Whitney, and Mr. Davies. Mostly, Ever informs something which is related to her condition before and after the surgery. The second types of illocutionary is directive that has been found about 27 data using different types of sentences. The purpose of directive is to command, but it is in the different form of sentences. It can be in the form of interrogative and imperative sentences.

The meaning of utterances that are produced by the speakers are not always based on the form itself, but also depends on the context. The role of context is important to determine the utterances into types of illocutionary acts and types of sentences.
